In 2005, ISSOS was established by Jen Munro, a St Andrews University Graduate, who after working as a summer camp counselor in the USA, realised she wanted to provide students from all over the world, with a balanced summer programme.

St Andrews was the obvious choice for the first summer school due to its safe location and historical setting. The first session of ISSOS took place in 2006, with 50 students. In 2011, with growing demand, ISSOS Cambridge was launched. 2016 saw the launch of the third summer school at the prestigious Yale University in the USA. Students have always been at the heart of everything ISSOS does and we have listened to feedback from students and parents to develop all aspects of the company, fast becoming recognised as one of the top International summer schools.

ISSOS has grown significantly since 2005, attracting students from over 80 nationalities and catering to over 600 students. The 2022 Cambridge edition of The Variety Show saw some stellar vocal performances. Sixteen-year old Elise astounded the audience with her Opera rendition of Ave Maria. Students Zoey, Justus, Nine, Alfaaz, Korosh, and Wiktor each presented a range of singing and rap performances.

Keeping in mind the stages of growing up the students are currently experiencing at their ages; 15-year old Lucrezia's poetry about it being "okay to not be okay" as she highlighted the struggles of self-image, struck a chord with students and made them reflect deeply. This was a significant achievement for her as this was one of





her first poetry works written entirely in English. An element of comedy was injected into the evening with a segment of Improv Theatre by students Ela, Nidia, and Dominique who invited live audience feedback into their impromptu performance.

In true ISSOS fashion this evening was no stranger to clan rivalry. While the students took the evening as an opportunity to demonstrate their range of natural flair, it was also a chance for the ISSOS staff to put their dancing shoes on. Most notably, the students witnessed their counselors go toe-totoe with each other during a Lip-Sync Battle. 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ACADEMICS

Dragons' Den

The Business and Entrepreneurship class at Cambridge challenged the students to consider how they would tackle global issues in innovative ways. The UN Sustainable Development Goals formed the basis for the students' discussions of these challenges and the core concepts of values led business framed the programme.

The programme culminated in the students producing a pitch to present to their fellow ISSOS students and a selection of four formidable Dragons. Each team was asked to produce a thorough and professional pitch for a product, service or project that incorporated the knowledge and skills gained across the three weeks in class, whilst solving their targeted issue. Fundamental to each pitch was the principle of 'why' – the purpose and reasoning behind their idea.

The teams worked really hard in the preparation and delivery of their presentations, impressing the judges and audience with their level of professionalism. The students' ideas focussed on confronting issues such as gender equality, period poverty, hunger, sustainable energy production and marine pollution.



All of the students performed remarkably and should be very proud of their contributions. But there could only be one winning team, and The Dragons and I chose our winners on the idea we felt would have the greatest impact. The winning team were Margaux, Mahsa, Maria, Camille and Luca, whose business concept was 'Mens.' They envisioned a range of male grooming and cosmetics products that were aimed at reducing period poverty by alleviating the stigma by providing information on the packs and through the donation of sanitary products funded through profits gained. This innovative approach seeks to start meaningful conversations whilst providing a practical solution.

The class embodied an entrepreneurial approach, inspiring each other to think differently. I hope they can pass on this enlightened perspective in what I know will be accomplished future careers.

Journalism





This year's journalism class focused on understanding contemporary journalism and knowing which steps need to be taken, and which responsibilities fulfilled for people to gain back the trust in media that has been lost throughout the previous decades.

Understanding the theories behind concepts such as fake news, misinformation, disinformation, and much more was covered through conversation, discussion, and class debate, whereas the practical skillset of journalism was developed through writing, interviewing, and filming exercises.

Besides solely dealing with distrust in media, we spoke a lot about ethics of

journalism, why audiovisual elements in journalism carry significance, how research is conducted in media, how different audiences perceive the media, and how journalists need to express themselves for various audiences to understand them and engage with them. On top of that, we covered various communication science theories that can be used as a guide to effective writing – such as the two-step-flow communication model, the theory of confirmation biases, agenda setting theory and more.

Homework nights (despite initially sounding like the worst imaginable Evening Programme!) were a very popular part of class. During the first homework night, students interviewed their counselors and teachers, and wrote out articles based on the information gathered. For the second homework night, the students were divided into different columns and genres – each covering a part of the ISSOS experience in video format.

On top of learning how to write, research, and ask questions, the students dabbled in video and audio editing, podcasting, and filming – and turned our class into a wonderfully pleasant and highly functional editorial office.

Debate



After a busy few weeks learning the skills of Debate, the Final Night Debate was a chance for our Debate students to show off what they have learned to the rest of the campus. Taking place in the historic Cambridge Union, eight students discussed the motion: This house would limit the development of strong Artificial Intelligence.

Both sides of the house debated with skill and eloquence, trying to convince us of the benefits and harms in a world with this technology. In opening government we had Malek and Yasmina, who framed and defined the motion, telling us to imagine the harms that strong AI could bring. They concluded that the risk posed by stronger AI could be apocalyptic for humanity and lead to the destruction of our institutions and values. In opening opposition, Emelie and Wiktor told us that stronger AI could lead to greater human progress and that humanity and AI could coexist peacefully. In closing opposition, Zoey and Dominique both summarised the debate and introduced a burden, what is the value of humanity?

However, in the end, Connor and Alfaaz won the evening in the position of closing government. The two presented us with the idea that a stronger Al and humanity could not coexist in the workplace or in society and suggested that the motion would lead to the destruction of jobs and lower the quality of life for millions. Furthermore, they suggested that as Al is programmed by humans, it would contain all the same biases and prejudices, hence further expansion of Al would only lead to an expansion of these biases.

Connor and Alfaaz were chosen as our winners by a panel of the other Debate students, all of whom were in agreement as to the high quality of the debate that evening.

Outdoor Leadership





This year's outdoor leadership course was designed to support students in developing the skills and qualities needed to excel both as a leader and as a team player. Through a mixture of sports, outdoor pursuits and classroom-based lessons our group approached the classes with both enthusiasm and a hard-working spirit.

Throughout the elective students worked in different teams where they were able to make friends and develop relationships with their peers. We explored types of leaders and the students developed a knowledge of six different leadership styles and then researched well known leaders who exemplify each of the six styles and made comparisons to their own leadership style. Throughout every team challenge different students volunteered, and were chosen, to become team leaders. This allowed each individual to step up in challenges where they felt particularly confident. We also took part in three water-based trips; raft building, sailing and punting. Many of the students were pushed outside of their comfort zones during these activities and it was wonderful to see everyone working together to overcome challenges in the water. As well as having fun, the students learned invaluable skills such as patience, bravery and teamwork. In sailing students had to communicate effectively in pairs to successful manoeuvre the boat. A real highlight of the elective course was the final session when we punted down the River Cam, students had to trust each other for balance and directions. Luckily we all stayed dry this time!

It has been my pleasure to teach the outdoor leadership class this year. I hope that all of the students have developed confidence and resilience as a result of the elective class. I know that this wonderful group of young people will go on to great things!

Devising a piece of theatre is no easy feat! It requires an enormous amount of creativity, a huge amount of collaboration, and a tremendous amount of hard work. In just 3 short weeks they put together a completely unique play entitled 'Unheard Narratives', a deeply personal, funny one moment then heartwarming the next, piece of theatre. 


