In Youth Leadership we explored intercultural differences and commonalities through shared experiences and privileges, and how to use them responsibly while staying attuned to oneself and others. Students learned to introspect, manage emotions, empower strengths, and navigate vulnerabilities within themselves and the group. Guided by facili-teachers, students developed their roles as leaders, creating a safe and productive group environment. All students jumped into this very different academic programme, taking part in team tasks and engaging in creative problem solving. All students worked very well together and grew in self-confidence and their individual leadership abilities.

After three weeks, students engaged in a variety of workshops designed to introduce different techniques to realise personal potential. They began to understand the growth mindset and we hope this is something they will continue to learn about and develop to become the leaders of the future.

ELECTIVES



At ISSOS Summer School, the Art Elective served as a space for personal expression where students not only honed their artistic abilities but also cultivated life skills such as resilience, adaptability, and creative problem-solving.

During the 11 sessions, students delved into various creative processes including printmaking, relief plaster casting, ceramics, watercolour painting, and figurative drawing. As always, some of the students entered the art classroom declaring: "I can't draw!". It was wonderful to see those "I can't draw!" students embrace each activity only to discover their own potential in different creative processes.

My teaching approach aims to cultivate a supportive environment that encourages students to overcome their inhibitions and experiment with new creative techniques. Central to this approach is an emphasis on engaging with the world around us and maintaining a daily creative practice. Foraging walks allowed students to collect materials for projects and create their own inks, sparking discussions about the local environment and igniting their imagination as they transformed found objects into artworks. A memory that will stay with me is when I asked students to do watercolour studies outside and they happily painted (without complaint) amidst the gentle Scottish drizzle. Their resilience and ability to find joy despite the weather exemplified their dedication to the creative process. By encouraging students to let go of self-imposed limitations, embrace experimentation, and immerse themselves in the artistic journey, I witnessed students grow and develop newfound confidence.

The play Seventeen explores the themes of coming of age, friendship, and loss. It follows the story of a group of teenagers in a small town who are all dealing with the challenges of growing up.


